Mental illness, also called mental health disorders, refers to a wide range of mental health conditions – disorders that affect your mood, thinking and behavior.


Autism is a neurological and developmental condition existing in different degrees, related to brain development. It impacts how individuals perceive and socialize with others. Signs are usually observed in the early childhood years, but autism is a life long condition.

According to Autism Society, approximately one in three kids are bullied in hallways, classrooms and during schoolrelated activities each year. More troubling – students living with autism spectrum disorder are 63 percent more likely to be recipients of bullying behavior than typically developing peers. Adults are in no way immune to the problem. One in six has experienced bullying behavior in the workplace according to the report.
